Humanities:

This half term, our project in humanities has been Jack the Ripper and Victorian life. We have learned about the mystery of the unsolved crimes that occurred in Whitechapel in 1888 and also what life was like for the poor compared to the aristocracy, in particular finding out some of the jobs children were expected to do. The children explored this topic by imagining they were a Victorian journalist, writing a new piece for their newspaper each week over the half term.



English:

This term, Year 9 have been working on non-fiction reading. This involves looking at various non-fiction texts more critically than in previous years and developing skills that will help them next year in their transition to GCSE. They already had a solid understanding of the techniques to look for when encountering new text, and this scheme of work has taught them a more systematic way of combining the various things they have learned across KS3 in preparation for the English Language GCSE. It also involves looking at texts from different eras and how to infer information about the genre, audience and purpose by looking closely at the language used.

It is often difficult to engage students in reading, but the English Department has begun putting together a reading comprehension folder. These are tailored to specific students' interests, but they can then be shared with those in other groups or year groups to encourage reading. They include a few pages of text and comprehension questions to ensure that the pupil has understood what they have read and teaches them vital skills of retrieving information. Because they are developed with input from the students themselves, engagement is higher. This exemplifies Reddish Hall School's dedication to making learning inclusive and bespoke to the needs and interests of our pupils.

Next term, Year 9 will be looking at 'Pop & Poetry' and learning how many of the techniques used my modern artists have their roots in the poetic styles of the past.

Year 11 have been revising English Language paper 2 this half term in preparation for the summer exams. We have been reading a range of non-fiction texts and practising the reading skills needed for the exam and then having a go at writing our own articles, letters, and speeches.

Next half term, the focus will be more bespoke to each class as teachers identify the gaps to be filled before exam season. For example, one class will be working on technical accuracy (spelling, punctuation and grammar), exam strategies and timings and writing skills.

Nurture:

This term, Nurture 1 have been visiting The Strawberry Fox Café, where pupils have had a budget to last them over three visits. They have thoroughly enjoyed this experience and have budgeted their money well. We have introduced morning meditation which pupils are engaging well with. Pupils have been learning about the USA in wider world and have enjoyed making native American dream catchers, lanterns for Independence Day and polyester prints of New York.

Year 11:


Armaan A has completed the AIM awards Level 1 diploma; he is the first student from Reddish Hall to achieve this.



Maths:

Some of our year 8s and 9s have recently completed a sourdough bread-making project within the maths curriculum. Over the past few weeks, students engaged in practical baking activities, intertwining fundamental mathematical skills with hands-on culinary experiences. From mastering measurements and ratios to scaling recipes and analysing data, our students were able to connect key mathematical concepts to real-world scenarios, using fractions, percentages, and decimals they carefully monitored their sourdough starters and worked with different systems of weight and capacity and volume to perfect their recipes. As the culmination of the project, students used the sourdough dough to craft delicious pizzas, showcasing their newfound skills in a delectable and satisfying way. This project not only provided students with a deeper understanding of mathematics but also fostered collaboration, problem-solving and practical life skills. We commend our students for their dedication and enthusiasm throughout this enriching learning journey.
