

We had a busy half term in KS3 Nurture, with trips to see Awful Auntie and the Imperial War Museum amongst many others. We were reading The Arrival by Shaun Tan and The Journey by Armin Greder in English. They both had themes around how we should treat people who we perceive as being different from us, the effects of war and migration. Students made creative digital flip books and wrote descriptive poems based on illustrations from the books. We linked this learning to our World War 1 Humanities lessons and ASPIRE. In Maths, we were mastering multiplication and division methods and applying this to real life situations such as working out wages.



This half term, we are consolidating English Functional Skills for writing and SPaG, while reading Escape to the River Sea by Emma Carroll. Our reading links to the Humanities and Wider World learning around South America, with a focus on the Amazon River and Brazil. This half term will be extra creative as we will also be working towards the Arts Mark Bronze Award, which is a recognised qualification that encourages children to explore the arts world and build leadership skills along the way.

We've had loads going on for our students' preparation for adulthood planning this month!

The start of this month kicked off with loads of college applications and transition visits to our local post-16 providers. Activities have included tours, visits and applications to Tameside College, The Trafford College group and Stockport College, Salford City College, Aquinas College, Pure College, The Growth Company and Digital Independent Specialist College; we're so excited to be planning our 2024 leavers exciting next steps with them.

To help give our 13- & 14-year-old students some more ideas for their next steps for the future, 24 of our students are visiting the amazing facilities over at City and Future Skills in Salford. We had a tour of the college, learning about careers and pathways into everything City Skills such as plumbing, carpentry, bricklaying, groundwork and mechanics.





Then we headed over to Future Skills to learn about a range of media: special effects make-up, music production, games design and loads more. It was great to learn about all the opportunities that Greater Manchester has to offer. All our Reddish Hall and Hive students did us proud, engaging in the tour and learning more about what college life is like.

Move over The Apprentice contestants! During this term, over 30 students have been preparing their interview skills with Michelle from The Department of Work and Pensions, who have recently partnered with the school to build on students' employability skills. After an initial interview preparation session, students took part in mock interviews as part of careers in the civil service. Michelle was really impressed with the interviews, producing feedback forms for all that took part. She found our students engaging, polite and able to talk about their interests and skills. All that took part did Reddish Hall proud. Michelle will continue working with the school going forward and some students are even volunteering for a second interview, just to hone their craft!

Year 10:

Our Year 10 classes have been busy exploring elastic potential energy as part of our GCSE physics energy topic. Students were tasked with converting elastic potential energy into kinetic energy in the form of an elastic band car. The task allowed the students to improve their problem-solving ability while also increasing their ability to work in a team environment. The students did fantastically with the challenge and engineered impressive and efficient elastic powered vehicles.



Princes Trust:

Just after Christmas, Ruby Duke started working on a Prince's Trust Unit that saw her making wax melts, which she finished last half term!

Knowing nothing about wax melts other than that they smelt lovely, she set about learning all she could, including how to make them (did you know your soya wax melts at 45 degrees? and that it melts quite easily in the microwave in a glass jug?) and how to present them. Ruby worked hard engaging her target audience, sending out a survey on Survey monkey to ask which scents people liked, and made several test batches (which were very messy, and she learned a lot about getting fiddly little dinosaurs out of the mould - often



without their heads and legs!) which she gave out for people to try. She did lots of research, made her own brand and packaging and even did a risk assessment to make sure that she was safely working with the hot wax! (The jug got hot after it had been in and out of the microwave a few times!) She had a lot of fun experimenting with the colours and the glitters and the scents (clean-up was not as much fun). You wouldn't believe how much just how much scent you need to put into a wax melt: it's a lot more than you think.

The results were incredible and Ruby's wax melts smelt and looked amazing!



PE:

This term, some of our students visited the squash courts where they got the chance to practice their skills and play matches. The students really enjoyed this experience, and massively improved their squash skills.
